<b>TOOLS FOR THE JOB REGISTER</b>	Online mechanism for asks and offers: sourcing facilities, bulk or joint purchase, machinery, tools, labour, joint working.	Producer Members seeking to reduce overheads and share costs together to improve viability.

<b>QUALITY ASSURANCE</b>	Report on the needs of small producers in relation to meeting standards, the resources available the existing charters, brands marks, and open gate systems. Suggestions on collaborative solutions to inform an umbrella benchmark quality standard or a future bid.	Producers seeking to reach high quality standards, reduce waste and improve the market appeal and value of their produce.
<b>ORDERING AND DELIVERY LOGISTICS</b>	Options study into existing systems to link producers with consumers (pros and cons of each) and a feasibility assessment of a neutral shared delivery logistic scheme, with a view to informing a future bid if necessary.	Small scale food producers in and around Bristol who need a route into new direct-sales or food hub markets and who are struggling with delivery logistics.

<b>THE BRISTOL CERTIFICATE: Livelihood Skills for Landworkers</b>	To provide a standardised skills base for all new growers in Bristol at different projects: enabling skills development, experience of different models, enterprise, marketing and community development skills.	New entrants to horticulture already or intending to work on Bristol urban food sites and hoping to pursue a livelihood in food production. The sites on which they are based will also benefit.
<b>SKILL SHARING MASTERCLASSES</b>	2 enterprise, 2 social and 2 technical masterclasses led by partners or external experts to enable skill sharing and practical demonstration.	Partner Members and a wider audience of interested people. Improved profile for host member and improved shared understanding.
<b>PROMOTING GROWING AS A LIVELIHOOD</b>	Careers Day at Food Connections (Garden Paths), Scaling up Community Growing Course for key garden volunteers, Where to Go To Grow listings (places, courses, events), exploring way to improve diversity in the growing sector.	People interested in pursuing growing as a skill or livelihood, or scaling up existing growing projects – people from diverse cultural backgrounds and excluded target groups.
